EXHIBIT B RESIDENTIAL FRANCHISE AGREEMENT

RECYCLABLE MATERIALS

- 1. Newspaper (including inserts, coupons, and store advertisements)
- 2. Chipboard
- 3. Corrugated cardboard
- 4. Mixed waste paper (including office paper, computer paper, magazines, junk mail, catalogs,

kraft bags and kraft paper, paperboard, egg cartons, phone books, brown paper, grocery bags,

colored paper, construction paper, envelopes, legal pad backings, shoe boxes, cereal and other

similar food boxes)

- 5. Glass containers (including brown, clear, and green glass bottles and jars)
- 6. Aluminum (including beverage containers, food containers, small scrap metal)
- 7. Steel or tin cans
- 8. Plastic containers classified under Resin Identification Code Nos. 1 through 7, inclusive.
- 9. Any other materials mutually agreed to by the FRANCHISEE and the City.

To qualify as Recyclable Materials, all Recyclable Materials must be reasonably clean and otherwise in a condition acceptable to commercial recycling facilities. Without limiting the foregoing, Recyclable Materials mixed with more than a de minimis amount of Garbage, shall be considered contaminated ("Contaminated"). Contractor may impose a fee or charge for placement of Contaminated Recyclable Materials in a Recycling Container for Collection, or may charge for and dispose of such Contaminated materials as Solid Waste, and may refuse to accept such Contaminated materials. Franchisee may remove a type of material from the list of Recyclable Materials where no commercially viable market exists.
