

#### Summary

In an era of unprecedented economic and political change, leaders of the local, regional, state, and not-for-profit agencies in Western Nevada are collaborating with urgency, and a common vision to improve the quality of life and economic prosperity of the region. The combined infrastructure, program, and policy recommendations outlined in this report are critical to building a stronger community. The Shared Federal Framework (SFF) is designed to articulate the federal regulatory, policy, and funding needs and priorities of Northern Nevada.

The initial objectives of the SFF were focused on economic development and infrastructure investments that support short- and long-term job growth. The early champions of the SFF were members of the City of Reno, City of Sparks, and Washoe County.

Current SFF participants are predominantly associated with the Washoe County region and the Lake Tahoe Basin. The SFF is a dynamic group and the number of participating entities is expected to grow over time. It is anticipated that additional county and city governments in Northern Nevada will join the SFF discussions as well as members of the private sector. Participation in the SFF is voluntary and no costs will be incurred by participants unless they desire to do so. Project/Policy Description	The Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) provides funding and control to communities to meet local needs for economic development, housing, and public services. CDBG's eligible activities include funding economic development programs, mitigating blight, creating jobs, providing housing, and funding public services that benefit low- to low-moderate income individuals.
Regional Significance	Reno uses its CDBGs to fund infrastructure improvements that benefit eligible neighborhoods; housing programs for low-income individuals; and public services for very-low income individuals and households that facilitate recovery from homelessness. In FY 12/13, Reno's CDBGs supported services for >5,000 individuals, provided > 60 units of housing, and preserved/created 6 jobs.
	Sparks utilizes CDBG funds with Reno and Washoe County to finance Continuum of Care, the Silver State Fair Housing Council, and the Community Assistance Center in Reno. Sparks designates a share of its CDBG funding for the rehabilitation of homes owned and occupied by low and moderate-income households. The Housing Rehabilitation Deferred Loan Program assists single-family homeowners with zero percent interest deferred loans up to \$20,000. The Emergency Repair Grant Program provides single-family homeowners with a one-time grant up to \$2,500 for life safety emergencies and ADA modifications.
	CDBG funding is additionally used to upgrade aging infrastructure in older, low, and moderate income neighborhoods. Sparks plans for investments over \$500,000 for improvements in sidewalks, curbs, and gutters along $5^{\rm th}$ Street in FY 2013/2014.

Project Description	HOME provides formula grants to states and local governments to create affordable housing for low-income households. HOME's eligible activities include providing financing assistance to eligible homeowners for rehabilitation and to new homebuyers for home purchase. HOME funds may also be used to build or rehabilitate housing for rent or ownership by low-income individuals.
Regional Significance	The City of Reno, the City of Sparks and Washoe County comprise the Washoe County HOME Consortium (WCHC), which receives and administers HOME funds in Reno, Sparks and unincorporated Washoe County. These funds can be utilized for pre-development, development, construction, acquisition, preservation and substantial rehabilitation of affordable, permanent or transitional, housing units. WCHC's primary goal is to help low-income persons obtain affordable housing. WCHC additionally allocates funds for deposit and rental assistance to homeless families who meet certain qualifying criteria. In FY12/13, the WCHC developed and/or rehabilitated approximately 100 rental units that are affordable to

households earning no more than 50 percent of the area median income (AMI), as well as provided deposit and rental assistance to approximately 50 renter households. Significantly, in FY12/13, HOME funds expended by the WCHC for completed rental projects leveraged approximately \$18,635,039 in private and state resources. HOME Consortium and the Low Income Housing Tax Credit have provided much needed development in low and medium income neighborhoods. The recent construction of a 43-unit housing development in the Oddie Boulevard corridor is just one example of this program's success. The affordable housing developments in Sparks are accredited to HOME and the Low Income Housing Tax Credit. The HOME Consortium is a Housing and Urban Development funded program focused on affordable housing. This program combined with the Low Income Housing Tax Credit has encouraged investments in Sparks' Oddie Boulevard corridor. These programs are currently threatened due to a tax reform proposal set to eliminate "all special provisions in the form of exclusions, deductions, and credits and other preferences" unless they have support from Senators. Policy Description:	Under current law, Main Street merchants are required to collect state and local sales taxes while internet and mail-order retailers are not subject to the same requirements. The Marketplace Fairness Act would remove the unfair competitive advantage that internet retailers have over our Main Street merchants.
Regional Significance	The Marketplace Fairness Act is not a new tax, but instead a way of leveling the playing field. It will provide substantial funding to state and local governments without increasing the federal deficit. According to the National Conference of State Legislatures, state and local governments lose an estimated \$23.3 billion annually to uncollected taxes on remote sales. The bill would greatly assist our city by providing a much needed source of revenue as we continue to struggle out of the recession.

Additionaly, because the State of Nevada does not assume the federal share of providing Medicaid services to eligible persons in county custody, inmates lose eligibility which results in the entire cost of inmate's care to fall on the county.	
	A conflict with Medicaid regulations resulted with the passage of the Affordable Care Act (ACA), which requires Qualified Health Plans (QHP) offered through Insurance Exchanges to cover inmates pending disposition of charges which would maintain their coverage. To date, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services have declined to issue revised regulations which would harmonize the definition of "inmate of a public institution" with the ACA. Without this reconciliation of the regulations, inmates enrolled under QHPs would be eligible to receive services from that plan but those who are Medicaid eligible would not be covered. In fact, many in-custody QHP eligible individuals will lose their income and become Medicaid eligible. Clearly the administration of both programs will be much more complicated without changes to the regulations.	
Regional Significance	The Washoe County Sheriff's Office currently has responsibility for operations and funding for incarceration; the Washoe County Department of Social Services coordinates with the WCSO to provide health care assistance to indigent clients with a total budget of over \$20 million annually expended on indigent health care. A change supporting continuation or even suspension of benefits while incarcerated will ensure eligible clients remain within the current health care system and ensure efficiencies for funding at a Federal, State, and County level. At a larger level, benefit qualified jail inmates under the ACA would provide new revenues for counties to provide more comprehensive services, particularly substance abuse treatment. Such treatment generally results in measureable savings in the overall cost of health care

Regional Significance of Project/Policy – describe current project status	One of the highest priorities for the City to protect from flooding is the Sparks industrial area, which contributes to nearly 25,000 jobs, along with protection to the Reno/Tahoe International Airport and areas throughout the Truckee Meadows, including downtown Reno. The Army Corps of Engineers appears to have the potential to move Sparks closer toward its flood control goal. The Corps is considering a 50-year plan versus a locally preferred 100-year plan. 	Due to Sequestration, the FAA was allowed to raid the "Grants-in-Aid for Airports" program (e.g. AIP funding) of \$253 million in 2013 to pay air traffic control tower operational costs, including controller salaries. This is a contradictory use of AIP funds since airports cannot use AIP funding for the day-to-day operations of their facilities, and yet the FAA was allowed to use AIP funding for exactly that purpose.
	The FAA's recent "solution" to staffing cuts has set a disturbing precedence. Although the transfer of AIP funds to the FAA for day-to-day operations was labeled a "one-time" event, upcoming funding issues are great enough to raise the concern that it could happen again. The FAA cut expenditures by \$486 million in FY2013 to meet the requirements of Sequestration, with upcoming FY2014 expenditure reductions expected to be \$697 million. Although the FAA has already identified \$500 million in cuts through overtime, travel, contracts, services, attrition and hiring freezes, the FAA must also account for \$100 million in mandatory pay increases. This leaves a shortfall of \$337 million still to be identified which should not be drawn from the AIP grant program.

	PFC collections were first authorized in 2000, but capped at \$4.50 per departing passenger. Inflation has eroded the purchasing power of the PFC. With dwindling reserves and allocations from AIP funding sources (budget cuts and sequestration), the PFC program's \$4.50 cap needs to be raised and indexed to inflation or uncapped entirely. Unlike AIP funds, PFC funds are generated locally and therefore local communities should have more flexibility in determining their respective PFC cap levels based on their better understanding of local conditions.

RTAA's winter-related construction shutdown for airfield projects begins at Thanksgiving and runs through April 1.
