

#### Summary

In an era of unprecedented economic and political change, leaders of the local, regional, state, and not-for-profit agencies in Northern Nevada are collaborating with urgency, and a common vision to improve the quality of life and economic prosperity of the region. About 1 million people are residents of this region and it attracts millions more as a visitor destination. The combined infrastructure, program, and policy recommendations outlined in this report are critical to building a stronger community. The Shared Federal Framework (SFF) is designed to articulate the federal regulatory, policy, and funding needs and priorities of Northern Nevada.

The initial objectives of the SFF were focused on economic development and infrastructure investments that support short- and long-term job growth. The early champions of the SFF were members of:

- City of Reno
- City of Sparks
- Washoe County

Current SFF participants are predominantly associated with Washoe County and the Lake Tahoe Basin. The SFF is a dynamic group and the number of participating entities is expected to grow over time. It is anticipated that additional county and city governments in Northern Nevada will join the SFF discussions as well as members of the private sector. TMWRF requires funding for overhauls and to meet Federal Regulatory standards. The project will utilize a 1.0 megawatt co-generator to convert methane gas into electricity for Reno, Sparks, and Washoe County. This project will generate considerable operational productivities for the treatment plant, decrease demand on the regional power grid, and produce in more affordable and reliable energy. Sparks has enacted a five year capital spending plan with \$50 million investment in the TMWRF. The waste water treatment plant is the region's largest and spends \$2 million dollars annually for electricity. Project/Policy Description:	LTRA is crucial to continuing the vital Environmental Improvement Program (EIP) at Lake Tahoe. The creation of the EIP spawned from the need to make more progress toward achieving the environmental threshold standards as directed in the Bi-State Compact. Following the Compact amendment in 1980, TRPA adopted nine environmental threshold carrying capacities which set environmental standards for the Lake Tahoe Basin. The nine threshold categories are water quality, soil conservation, air quality, vegetation, wildlife, fisheries, scenic resources, noise, and recreation. The thresholds serve as our benchmarks of success for the health of the Tahoe Basin and many of the standards will take generations to achieve.
	Priorities for funding would include stormwater/water quality, hazardous fuels reduction, and invasive species management and prevention. Continuing funding for other important initiatives is included in the areas of science, special species such as the Lahontan cutthroat trout, and watershed restoration. The bill protects the Tahoe Basin from future mining claims.
Regional Significance of Project/Policy – describe current project status	Because of the extraordinary support of EIP partners, more than \$1.6 billion has been invested over the last 15 years in environmental restoration projects and scientific evidence shows the loss of clarity is slowing in Lake Tahoe. In 2012, lake clarity was the best it's been in 10 years. This news has inspired a renewed commitment to continuing Tahoe Basin restoration efforts and we believe our collective energy and tremendous investment of resources is making a positive difference. The key to the success of the EIP is the partnership approach to leveraging funds. By having commitments from the federal, state and local governments along with the private sector, EIP dollars are used cost effectively and for maximum benefit. This partnership approach sets Tahoe apart from other large-scale restoration programs in the United States which rely more heavily on federal and state funding.
