Your application for a Gaming license in the City of Sparks is scheduled to go in front of the Sparks City Council on September 23, 2013 at 2:00 p.m. in the Legislative Chambers located at 745 4th Street, Sparks, Nevada. If you are not able to appear at the City Council meeting, you may contact the Sparks City Clerk at 353-2350 after the meeting date to obtain information on the Council's decision on your gaming license application.

The City Council will determine whether to grant or deny your application for a gaming license based on criteria set forth in Section 5 of the Sparks Municipal Code.

Sparks Municipal Code:

Section 5.24.070 Persons not qualified for gaming licenses:

The following persons are not qualified to hold any gaming license under the provision of this chapter:

A. A person who has been convicted within the preceding five years of:

- 1. A felony of any crime which under the laws of this state would be a felony***
- 2. Any crime of which fraud or intent to defraud was an element, whether in this state or elsewhere***
- 3. Any crime of moral turpitude, embezzlement or larceny against his employer or any gaming licensee***
- 4. Unlawful possession or distribution of a controlled substance***
- 5. Any law pertaining to gaming***

B. A person under the age of twenty-one years

C. Any person in the constructive custody of any federal, state or municipal law enforcement authority

D. A person who, by reason of being associated with organized crime, or being of notorious and unsavory reputation, is not a suitable person to received a license

E. A person who has made a false, misleading or fraudulent statement on his or her application for a license or work permit

Section 5.24.110C Investigation - Council approval

Upon completion of the background investigation, the chief of police shall make a recommendation to the council regarding the suitability of each applicant to receive an gaming license. The council shall determine whether the applicant shall receive a gaming license. The council has full power and authority to deny any application for any cause which it deems reasonable. If an applicant is denied, the council shall adopt findings of fact stating the cause of the denial.
