RE: PCN18-0053 – Consideration and possible approval of an amendment to the Comprehensive Plan to change the land use designation from 14.1 acres of Multi-family Residential (MF24), 50.9 acres of Commercial (C), 33.6 acres of Employment Center (EC), 46.9 acres of Intermediate Density Residential (IDR) and 13.1 acres of Open Space (OS) to 19.1 acres of Multi-family Residential (MF24), 38.6 acres of Commercial (C), 33.6 acres of Employment Center (EC), 54.2 acres of Intermediate Density Residential (IDR) and 13.1 acres of Open Space (OS) on a site approximately 167.1 acres in size located at the southeast corner of La Posada Drive and Pyramid Way, Sparks, NV.

Please see the attached excerpt from the August 2, 2018 Planning Commission meeting transcript.

COMMISSIONER BROCK: Commissioner Brock. 1 2 Second. CHAIRMAN VANDERWELL: Okay. I have a first and 3 a second. Any further discussion? 4 Okay. All in favor? 5 (Commission members said "aye.") 6 CHAIRMAN VANDERWELL: Any opposed? 7 Okay. Thank you. Motion carries. 8 Next, we'll move along to PCN17-0053, 9 consideration and possible action, amendment to 1.0 Comprehensive Plan to change the land use designation. 11 MS. MELBY: Good evening. Karen Melby, 12 Development Service Manager. 13 Before you is a Comprehensive Plan amendment to 14 change the land use designation for a property located 15 in what we're calling Stonebrook West. It's the western 16 portion of the Stonebrook planned development. 17 You can see the boundary of the Stonebrook 18 planned development is outlined in red here. And this 19 kind of purplish-red color, lavender, I guess, would be 2.0 the property that's under the subject property today, or 21 subject area. 22 The proposed Comprehensive Plan amendment 23 covers the western portion, which is approximately 167 2.4 acres in size, of the Stonebrook planned development.

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The portion under this request is designated Commercial, Business Park, Single-Family and Multi-Family 2 3 Residential uses. The Stonebrook planned development consists of 4 approximately 610 acres and was approved for 2,135 5 dwelling units, 50 acres of Commercial, 33.6 acres of Business Park. 7 The City Council approved the Stonebrook Final 8 Design Standards and Regulations on April 24, 2006. 9 To date, there are two subdivision maps that 10 have been approved by City Council on the eastern 11 portion, over here. You can see some of the lots 12 already built. 13 Phase 1 consisted of 617 single-family lots, 14 which under construction are 218 lots. Phase 2 was 15 approved on March 14, 2018 by City Council for 459 16 single-family lots. 17 The portion of the Stonebrook planned 18 development covered by this Comprehensive Plan amendment 19 consists of four parcels. 20 Woops. Too fast. 2.1 This is the existing master plan designation 22 map. On this map, there are 14.1 acres of 2.3 Multi-Family 24, 50.9 acres of Commercial, 33.6 acres of 24 Employment Center, 46.9 acres of Intermediate Density 25

Residential, and 13.1 acres of Open Space.

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This is the proposed master plan amendment.

The applicant is requesting to amend the land use map to have 19.1 acres of Multi-Family 24, 38.6 acres of

Commercial, 33.6 acres of Employment Center, 54.2 acres of Intermediate Density Residential, and 13.1 acres of Open Space.

The proposed request does not change the number or type of land uses. The applicant's request proposes to relocate these land uses. The proposed changes are, in part, because the applicant is interested in creating a multi-family, a larger multi-family development which is not split by the drainage channel, or Reach 4. Relocating the multi-family more central results in needs of shuffling some of the other land uses.

If the Comprehensive Plan land use amendment is approved, the Stonebrook Final Design Standards and Regulation, which is the handbook for Stonebrook, will need to be amended to reflect the approved land use pattern before any development can occur on this property.

Addressing the findings. Finding CP1, which is conformance with the Regional Plan. Complying with Goal 1.1, the subject property is located within the City of Sparks limits, and a portion of it is in the Truckee

Meadows service area.

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The Stonebrook planned development is located in Impact Fee Service Area Number 1 and has been included in the City's utilities and facilities plans. The Stonebrook is, however, located outside of the 6-minute response time for the Sparks Fire Department and emergency medical response. However, the Fire Department can request inclusion of this area into the mutual aid agreement with the Truckee Meadows Fire Protection.

So based on this, staff is of the opinion that this request complies with the regional goal 3.5.

Finding CP2, which is the implementation of the Sparks Comprehensive Plan. The proposed land use changes increases the exposure to Pyramid Highway for the commercial land use, and the new configuration of the employment center provides more flexibility while integrating it into the commercial land use area.

For these reasons, the proposed amendment is consistent with goal MG1 for providing nonresidential land use, Goal MG2 for fostering diversity and land use mix, and Policy MG1 for a diverse and integrated mix of residential and nonresidential land uses.

The increase in MF24 and IDR support goals $\rm H2$ and Policy $\rm H2$ by combining additional lands for two

different types of housing to meet the high demand for housing in this region.

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Policy MG5 requires a fiscal impact analysis. The submitted fiscal impact analysis and update letter concluded that the development will produce a revenue surplus to the City's General Fund of \$7.6 million over the initial 20-year period. The property is estimated to generate \$2 million in revenue for the City's Road Fund, with estimated expenditures of \$8.6 million, for a deficit of \$7.6 million over the 20-year renew period. Combining the negative Road Fund and the net positive General Fund, this project would produce a positive impact off about a million dollars over a 20-year period.

Supporting Policy MG5(b) and Policy CF1, the Stonebrook planned development was approved in 2006 and has been included in the infrastructure planning for this region and is part of IFSA Number 1. As the development occurs, impact fees will be collected for the sanitary sewer and storm drainage improvements.

Finding CP3, which is compatible with the surrounding land uses. The Stonebrook planned development is located in the southeast corner of La Posada Drive and Pyramid Way. This request is to change the land uses on 167 acres of the 610 total acres

of the planned development. The intersection of 1 La Posada and Pyramid is a commercial node. To the 2 south is the Tierra Del Sol planned development and the 3 Washoe County Regional Park Lazy Five. 4 Therefore, staff believes that the proposed 5 Stonebrook land use changes will not adversely impact 6 their surrounding land uses. 7 Finding CP4, which is public notice. Public notice was published in the Reno Gazette-Journal on July 20th, 2018. 10 The neighborhood meeting held by the applicant 11 was held on December 4th, 2017, with seven people 12 attending. Those attended expressed concerns about 13 increased traffic on Pyramid and the traffic speeds on 14 Pyramid. 15 That concludes my presentation. And I'd be 16 happy to answer any questions. 17 CHAIRMAN VANDERWELL: Thank you. 1.8 Any questions yet? 19 Commissioner Carey. 2.0 COMMISSIONER CAREY: Oh, I could hold on. 21 Sorry. 22 CHAIRMAN VANDERWELL: You'll hold on. 23 COMMISSIONER CAREY: Yeah. Thank you. 24 COMMISSIONER VANDERWELL: Thank you. 25

This is a public hearing. I'll open the public 1 2 hearing. Are there any requests to speak? 3 Thank you. 4 Cameron Andelin. And if I pronounced your name incorrectly, I apologize. And correct it for me, please. So just state your name and address for the 7 8 record. MR. CAMERON ANDELIN: My name is Cameron 9 Andelin, 8100 Pyramid Way. Good evening, Commissioner, 10 Planning Commissioners, members. 11 So I'm a neighbor to the east. We have a farm 12 there that we operate. And I just want to go on record, 13 we're not necessarily opposed to development and the 14 property owner's right to develop. But we do want to go 15 on record stating that we have a recorded easement 16 17 through the subject property that we want to make sure that we're able to maintain and protect. It happens 18 to -- the location of it where it's been used, where we 19 2.0 use it, happens to be kind of through the multi-family section part of that. 21 We also have our -- our irrigation water comes 22 23 from the Orr Ditch that goes through this property. so we want to make sure that that would be protected. 24

And the last thing I just wanted to go on

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record about is, should we desire to develop our property, we would want to make sure that our ability to do that is protected and, with this adjacent development, that it wouldn't encumber or prohibit any of our development.

Thank you.

CHAIRMAN VANDERWELL: Thank you.

Okay. Danielle Donica.

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MS. DANIELLE DONICA: Danielle Donica, 25 North Tropicana Circle.

I'm very confused why we're fighting this again, but. I was here in 2006 when we were fighting with the casino.

I'm wondering why we want to put up more apartments and more businesses there when we already have horrible, horrible, horrible traffic on Pyramid Highway. And the speed limit was increased to 55, which makes it absolutely impossible for me to not wait about, approximately eight minutes before I turn from Pyramid onto David James to get to my house now, which is already ridiculous, so.

She was saying something about you're going to do \$7 million in road construction if this happens. And so my guess is they're going to widen Pyramid, which means more noise for us, because we're the second street

off of Pyramid. 1 More lights. The speed limit would have to change. More congestion. 3 4 I don't understand why we're saying we want apartments out there. 5 And my question -- and I don't know if you guys 6 can answer this. Or maybe you can answer this. What is an employment center? 9 CHAIRMAN VANDERWELL: When you get back up. MS. MELBY: When I get back up there? Oh, 10 11 okay. CHAIRMAN VANDERWELL: We'll make sure that she 12 13 asks. 14 MS. DANIELLE DONICA: Okay. And, also, the intermediate density, what that means, what the 15 definition of that means. 16 And our sewer, they're talking about they're 17 going to be on City water. Of course, we're Washoe 18 County. They would be Sparks. And that's how the whole 19 20 thing started with the casino as well. Our sewer has been put off really 12 years, because we don't have a 21 22 grant to pay for it, because we have no money, I guess, in Washoe County. But Sparks can have everything else. 23 The new subdivision that was put down at the end of 24 David James, their sewer has all that, all the City 25

But, we're, again, another island in Washoe stuff. County, which gets put off. 2 Thank you. 3 CHAIRMAN VANDERWELL: Thank you. 4 Are there any more requests to speak on this 5 item? MS. SMITH: I have two more, Madam Chair. 7 CHAIRMAN VANDERWELL: Okay. Thank you. 8 Is it Chris Mart? 9 MR. CHRIS MOLL: Moll. 10 CHAIRMAN VANDERWELL: Moll. Go ahead and come 11 If you can please state your name and your 12 address for the record, please. 13 MR. CHRIS MOLL: Chris Moll, M-O-L-L, 1.4 7310 Aqueen Court. I'm also the president of the HOA 15 for off of Tierra Del Sol there, Serena Springs. 16 And when I think about the time that I've spent 17 and the one question that has come up over and over 18 again, because I've seen this map somewhere before 19 several years ago, but the -- my residents' biggest 20 question is, okay, when are we going to finish Tierra 21 Del Sol? When is that going to wrap around to Dolores? 2.2 Because the congestion going in and out of there, with 23 the increase in volume of traffic, it's getting ugly. 24 We're going to have to send some ambulances out there. 25

I saw one just coming up here today, all right, where 1 somebody hooked that U-turn at Dolores, and they didn't 2 leave a lot of room for anybody else. It was close. So, you know, to me, that's the big question. 4 When's it going to be built? 5 And, also, what are you going to do with the 6 Orr Ditch? Are you going to bury it? Because I don't 7 see it shown here on any of these maps. Do we have any answer to those questions? 9 CHAIRMAN VANDERWELL: We'll ask staff when they 10 come back up. 11 MR. CHRIS MOLL: Okay. 12 CHAIRMAN VANDERWELL: We're making notes. 13 MR. CHRIS MOLL: Okay. So what do you want me 14 to do next, just sit and wait for my answer? 15 CHAIRMAN VANDERWELL: No. Do you want to 16 finish your testimony? 17 MR. CHRIS MOLL: Well, yeah. It's just like I 18 My primary concern and the thing I want to be able 19 to at least get back to the homeowners, including me, 20 is, okay, when are they going to finish that street? 21 Okay. When's it going to, is it going to tie around? 22 23 And is it going to be done before the development? After the development? Do we have any idea when that's 2.4 25 going to be done?

So there's also utilities out there that, you 1 know, are already in the ground. And there's just no 2 asphalt running to them. So all that underground work, 3 as far as I can tell, all the way up to the property 4 line, has all been done. So what are we waiting for? CHAIRMAN VANDERWELL: Okay. 6 MR. CHRIS MOLL: Okay? 7 CHAIRMAN VANDERWELL: Perfect. 8 MR. CHRIS MOLL: And that's it. Thank you. 9 CHAIRMAN VANDERWELL: Thank you for the 10 question. 11 Is it Robert == and what's your last name? 12 apologize. 13 MR. ROBERT BARTOO: I'm not for or against 14 this. 15 CHAIRMAN VANDERWELL: Oh, I'm sorry, sir. Can 16 you state your name and your address for the record? 17 MR. ROBERT BARTOO: I live at 1186 Hushfield 18 Court. 19 CHAIRMAN VANDERWELL: Okay. And your name? 20 MR. ROBERT BARTOO: Robert Bartoo. 21 CHAIRMAN VANDERWELL: Thank you. 22 MR. ROBERT BARTOO: And I'm not for or against 23 this. But I do have an issue with traffic. And, I 2.4 think, because you cannot leave my neighborhood safely 25

right now, that that needs to be addressed before we 1 endanger any more of the residents. It's really that 2 If there is a fire anywhere out Pyramid Highway simple. at 5:00 o'clock at night, no one is getting out of my 5 neighborhood, because the traffic just won't let you. I don't care if you extend La Posada out to the 6 Without doing something, people are going 7 new parkway. to get hurt. And I'll leave it at that. CHAIRMAN VANDERWELL: Thank you. Appreciate 10 that. 11 Do we have any more requests to speak on this 12 agenda item? Anybody that didn't sign in that would 13 14 like to speak? Okay. With that, I'm going to close the public 15 hearing. And Ms. Melby is going to come up. 16 MS. MELBY: Before I address any questions --17 CHAIRMAN VANDERWELL: Yes. 18 MS. MELBY: -- the applicant would like to make 19 20 a presentation. CHAIRMAN VANDERWELL: Please. 2.1 MR. ANDY DURLING: Good evening, Madam Chair. 22 For the record, Andy Durling with Wood Rodgers. 23 you for the opportunity to address you tonight. 24 I just want to address a little bit maybe to 25

share with you maybe the justification, the rationale behind this request. The existing past request designations that's shown on -- oh, sorry. Thank you for the overhead.

The existing master plan designations that are shown on the screen are akin to what is approved in the Stonebrook PUD right now. The multi-family, which is located on the lower portion of the site, is bifurcated by Reach 4, which is the green open space area that you see running through that. When the Stonebrook PUD was originally approved, the area just to the north of this was a former Washoe County park. So it sort of made sense from a land use perspective to have the park and multi-family located adjacent to each other.

Since that time, Washoe County Parks disposed of that property. It's been rezoned to commercial in the county. It's located in unincorporated county. And as staff mentioned now, that kind of completed all four corners of the La Posada and Pyramid intersection to where you have really a strong commercial node at that location.

Looking at that, we then kind of went to another level of analysis on this property to determine what were appropriate land uses at this point in time, now, you know, 15 years later. So what we determined

is, you know, commercial makes sense to have that colocated with the commercial at La Posada and Pyramid.

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We then, at the same time, felt that it was appropriate to have the multi-family as well as the IDR, the other moderate density residential, to also be colocated near the intersection of Dolores and Pyramid.

To address maybe Commissioner Carey's comments from the workshop, there was a question about the size of the commercial, is it conducive to big box commercial? Looking at sort of the market as it stands in the area right now, there are, obviously, considerable amounts of commercial to the south of this, the Galleria, as well as the Kiley Ranch, that are conducive to the big box style of commercial.

Looking at that kind of saturation as well as just where the retail market is right now, really there is not as much of a need for that large, large commercial. So that's why there's a slight reduction in the commercial area, and you'll see on the map. Now we've concentrated the commercial towards Pyramid in a little bit narrower band. There is still at the north end here some ability to have some larger box, but it'll be a little bit more limited than maybe it was in the past.

We then wrapped the employment center, which is

the a business park. Primarily, we're anticipating that to be office-type uses. We felt like that was more appropriate off of Pyramid to have that kind of commercial up there. And then buffering the employment center and the multi-family together. Those are compatible uses next to each other.

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With that, we felt like this was a much better land use at this point in time than what was previously approved.

To address maybe some of the public's comments, Mr. Andelin, we are definitely well-aware of the easements that traverse his property, whether to access power. So we are, we've already reached out to him. We've had some meetings. We'll continue to meet with him on what's appropriate to perpetuate as well as possibly relocate.

This is sort of a master plan area. You'll note that the extension, Dolores, does go into kind of the greater Andelin farm area. So there are some anticipated connections that we know are kind of on the table. So we look forward to working with him as we continue.

To address maybe some of the concerns relative to traffic, we've been working closely with NDOT on this. There will be a number of new intersections

colocated with existing intersections at Robert Banks, 1 Dolores, and some of the other roadways that are to the 2 west side. With that, we will be building in additional 3 turn lanes, some medians, things like that, to help with the speeding aspect of those intersections. So with that, I would be happy to answer any 6 questions. And we appreciate staff's comprehensive overview of this and are in agreement with their 8 recommendation. 9 CHAIRMAN VANDERWELL: Okay. Any of the 10 Commissioners have any questions for Mr. Durling? 11 Commissioner Carey. 12 COMMISSIONER CAREY: Thank you, Madam Chair. 13 And thanks for the additional info about the 14 land use changes with the commercial. 15 I'm kind of curious in your opinion, going back 16 to the fiscal impact. So this, essentially, is 12 less 17 acres, give or take, less commercial, and what I 18 envision a multi-family and single-family units on this 19 property. In your experience, is typically reducing 20 commercial land uses and adding more residential land 21 uses, does that create more of a fiscal impact to the 22 City in a positive direction? 23 MR. ANDY DURLING: As far as, you know, when

you compare, it happens more just to a certain degree.

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When you're comparing commercial to multi-family, for 1 example, you're not looking -- you're losing some sales 2 3 tax potential. But you also don't have -- they're similar in the way that, you know, you're not 4 maintaining streets in a multi-family the same way 5 you're not maintaining streets in a commercial development. Right? Those are private driveways, 7 private parking, things like that. So from that 8 perspective, there's a wash, if you will. The residential is more or less staying the 10 same, the single-family residential, I should correct, 11 is more or less staying the same. 12 I think, really the moral of the story is this 13 area was kind of oversaturated with commercial. 14 maintain the employment center in its current acreage. 15 That was a priority for us and for staff. So you'll 16 note that, you know, the employment aspect of this 17 remains the same. So you get benefits from that as far 18 as live, work, and ability to capture trips within the 1.9 20 greater Spanish Springs area within the valley itself. So those are all positives. 21 COMMISSIONER CAREY: Okay. Thanks. 22 CHAIRMAN VANDERWELL: Anybody else? 23 I just have a really quick question. Can you 24 maybe drill down a little more on the employment center? 25

So you're going to say, you're saying it's going to be 7 like office, like are you -- dental, just service 2 offices, not a big like (indistinct) or anything like 3 that? MR. ANDY DURLING: So there are a number of uses that are permitted in the business park in Stonebrook, right now, not having those on the top of my 7 head. But we anticipate, just based on the kind of location of this, you're probably going to see something akin to what you see kind of on Sparks Boulevard with 10 the offices and things like that. 11 There may be some opportunities for some kind 12 of larger employers. Not sure what those might be right 13 now. But definitely there is a wide variety of 14 anticipated employers that could come into this area. 15 CHAIRMAN VANDERWELL: Perfect. Thank you. 16 Got any? 17 Yes, Commissioner Fewins. 18 Oh. COMMISSIONER FEWINS: Yeah, Madam Chair. 19 Commissioner Fewins. 20 There were a couple questions about the Orr 21 Ditch. 22 MR. ANDY DURLING: Yes. 23 COMMISSIONER FEWINS: And, I suppose, were YOU 24 thinking about that? 25

MR. ANDY DURLING: Thanks for reminding me. the Orr Ditch is identified, if you can see my pointer. So this green band, this open space band is the Orr Ditch as it traverses through this portion of Stonebrook. So in the handbook itself, there's a requirement that that effectively becomes an open space corridor with a regional trail. So that is a regional trail corridor. Whether it remains in an open ditch 9 fashion or is piped is kind of up to the landowner and, 10 obviously, working with the Orr Ditch Company on that. 11 So there would be, I would anticipate, probably 1.2 some piping portions of it as it goes through the site. 13 But at the end of the day, we have to perpetuate the 14 flow of that irrigation water through the site. 15 over the top of that corridor will be a regional trail. 16 COMMISSIONER FEWINS: Thank you. 17 Thank you. CHAIRMAN VANDERWELL: 18 MR. ANDY DURLING: Thanks. 19 CHAIRMAN VANDERWELL: Thank you, Karen. 20 Do any Commissioners have any questions? 21 22 Commissioner Carey. COMMISSIONER CAREY: Yeah, a question for 23 Concerning Finding CP2 and use, and staff 24 decided the Comprehensive Plan Goal MG1, and that's

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support economic vitality by providing nonresidential land use bases. The proposed comprehensive land use 2 change reduces commercial land use. So I was just kind 3 of wondering if you could provide some more information about the application of that policy and how it supports 5 this project. 7 MS. MELBY: I mean it's maintaining, essentially, the same amount of acreage. It's a little 8 bit of a reduction. But staff felt that they still are 9 maintaining the mix of uses. And that's why we felt 10 that we could use that finding, because it still has a 11 12 mix of residential and the employment center and commercial. 13 14 COMMISSIONER CAREY: Okay. Thank you. 15 CHAIRMAN VANDERWELL: Karen, I'm just going to, because I wrote it down, a couple of the questions 16 from --17 MS. MELBY: Uh-huh (affirmative). 18 CHAIRMAN VANDERWELL: -- a couple of the people 19 20 that asked questions. Can you define what the 21 intermediate density is? MS. MELBY: Intermediate density is 22 23 single-family residential. It is a density of 6 dwelling units to less than 10 dwelling units per acre. 2.4 25 CHAIRMAN VANDERWELL: Okay. Thank you. Then,

1 another one of the questions was the finish of Tierra Del Sol to Dolores Drive. Now, I guess, what my 2 question is, is are they in unincorporated Washoe 3 County, or are they within the City of Sparks? 4 MS. MELBY: Tierra Del Sol is within the City 6 of Sparks. That's on the east side of Pyramid. CHAIRMAN VANDERWELL: Okay. 7 MS. MELBY: And that would be part of the --8 when they built their project, when they start 9 construction, then we would be looking at all those, the 10 infrastructure and those roads. 11 CHAIRMAN VANDERWELL: Okay. Terrific. Thank 12 you. 13 Anyone else have any other questions? 14 COMMISSIONER READ: Yeah. Commissioner Read. 15 CHAIRMAN VANDERWELL: Commissioner Read. 16 COMMISSIONER READ: Yeah, there was one other 17 question by one of the public comments. They were 18 concerned about ensuring that their property could be 19 developed, that this wouldn't interfere in that. Can 20 you address that? 21 MS. MELBY: When, as they start to develop, 22 actually construction this project -- I mean, at this 23 point, we're only at a conceptual level of looking at 24 25 all this, of land use. But once they start doing the

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construction, then we make sure that there's -- we keep
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   in mind that they have -- that there are properties to
   the east to be developed, potentially, in the future.

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            CHAIRMAN VANDERWELL: Of course.
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            COMMISSIONER CAREY: I appreciate the
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   additional info from the applicant and staff. I guess,
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   I'm, you know, a little concerned about losing any
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   commercial land use in the city. I think, from a fiscal
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perspective, there's going to be some impact to the City's budget down the road.

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But I do concur with the assessment that, you know, the market for commercial real estate in the Spanish Springs valley has changed over the past 12 years. And certainly, I think, retail in general, the industry has changed a lot, too. So, you know, I think, it makes sense that the reduction in the commercial land use might make sense.

You know, from my estimation, looking through the staff report, it looks like, potentially, we'd be losing 46,000 square feet of commercial land use, or future buildings that could be build on that land use.

I'm a little concerned about that. But I do concur and I appreciate the applicant holding on to the employment center land use. I think, that's an important land use to keep.

And, I think, that the new configuration should, you know, provide some flexibility and maybe lead to a better development than what was originally proposed.

So I would support the motion. I just wanted to put those on the record.


